### **Notes from Michelle**

"Never help a child with a task at which he feels he can succeed." —Dr. Maria Montessori

"The education of even a small child, therefore, does not aim at preparing him for school, but for life."- Dr. Maria Montessori "The essence of independence is to be able to do something for one's self. Adults work to finish a task, but the child works in order to grow, and is working to create the adult, the person that is to be. Such experience is not just play... it is work he must do in order to grow up." –Dr. Maria Montessori

Last Tuesday evening we held our first PTLG meeting of the year. At that meeting there were teachers from both Lower and Upper Elementary present and they shared some tips for parents regarding the Montessori classroom. The major concept that we try to work on with the students is independence. Independence brings with it an automatic sense of responsibility. Freedom within limits is what we refer to when we discuss helping the children develop independence. There must be parameters in order for the concept to work. It is not free choice all day long, but a menu of prepared choices from which the child can choose. For example, you as the parent can prepare a list of chores. You can then let the child choose which chore they will complete each day. It is this ability to make a choice from a selection that can help the child develop the ability to think critically. As they make more choices they will begin to learn that every choice has a consequence, some very positive and possibly at times not so positive. But all independence comes with the recognition of the responsibility that accompanies it.

Independence also comes from the adults recognizing that children are fully capable of responsibility. That also is a hallmark of Montessori education. We trust children in a 3-6 year old classroom with real glass and real knives, because we trust that they will use them the way they are taught. We give them lessons and we model the behavior, and when they have observed and practiced under our guidance we set them free to do the work. This is the reason we ask parents not to carry backpacks for their child. It is a very simple gesture but it can convey to the child a sense of helplessness. When you give them the freedom to carry their own backpacks, it tells them you know they have the ability to help themselves. We have found a couple of lists of age appropriate chores as a starting point for parents who would like them. These are in your Friday Folder.

Your child's classroom will be sending you updated birthday celebration guidelines. The Lower Elementary has changed their treats to be defined ONLY as fresh fruit or vegetables. They have asked that parents no longer bring muffins or other snack type items. Only fresh fruit or vegetables will be passed out during the celebration. This can include the fruit-only frozen treats. Please look to your child's classroom newsletter for complete details. Also, for Upper Elementary, they are asking that students do not bring edible treats at all but simply some items the student feels represents themselves to show to the classroom. If your child chooses, they may make a donation of a book, plant or other small item to the classroom, but that is completely optional. The UE classrooms will also be sending out more details on these changes.

Thank you for choosing the unique and rewarding challenge of being a Montessori parent. We honor that partnership and want to work with you on this path for your child. Have a great weekend.

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### Notes from the Garden

This week in the garden we worked on a core teaching of our Fall Cycle, seed saving. Seed saving is a sensorial experience of genetic selection in the garden, and connects students with age-old agricultural practices. The season cycle, propagation and a simple botany/microbiology lesson about germination, fermentation and plant anatomy go along with seed saving. Some classes also sampled bruschetta made with our tomato and basil crops- more than once I heard "I don't like tomatoes, but may I have seconds?".

#### GARDEN BRUSCHETTA

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 loaf whole grain bread
- 2 cups diced tomatoes
- ¼ cup basil, cut into ribbons
- ¼ cup olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, minced

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Combine the tomatoes, basil, olive oil, garlic, and salt in a bowl and let the juices start to form.
- 2. Slice the bread, lay out on a platter, and ladle sauce over bread to enjoy.

A reminder that students will get wet and dirty doing garden chores. Please remind them to dress accordingly and pack a change of shoes if they are uncomfortable in damp shoes. Hats and water bottles are a must in our garden.

Fall crops are going in, we are remembering our guidelines in the garden, and first years are planting peas with their 6th year mentors.

Our mindfulness exercise this week focused on using our senses in silence to gain information about our environment. It's very exciting to hear students voice what a mindfulness practice does for their sense of place and their ability to focus.
